Overview of OECD-EU Youth Entrepreneurship Policy Academy

The European Commission and the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) are excited to announce the launch of the new **European Union-OECD Youth Entrepreneurship Policy Academy** (YEPA). This new initiative aims to strengthen youth entrepreneurship policies and programmes by raising knowledge about the barriers faced by young people in entrepreneurship and facilitating exchanges between policy makers, experts and young entrepreneurs on "what works" in youth entrepreneurship policy. This new initiative builds on an existing collaboration on <u>inclusive entrepreneurship</u> and <u>social entrepreneurship</u> undertaken by the European Commission and the OECD, which includes the award-winning report series <u>The Missing Entrepreneurs</u>. It was announced as a key action in the recent <u>EU Action Plan for Social Economy</u>.

The YEPA is a peer-learning network that seeks to strengthen youth entrepreneurship policies in the European Union (EU). Network participants will be comprised of policy makers from national and sub-national governments, young entrepreneurs (represented by national and international youth entrepreneurship networks), researchers and programme managers. As a specific focus will be given to social entrepreneurship, several social economy networks will be associated. Other stakeholders such as representatives of microfinance institutions or investors will be invited to participate in one or several dedicated thematic events.

A series of activities is planned for the YEPA following this launch event. Participants will be expected to participate in a series of six online workshops over the next three years in groups. Each workshop will focus on a specific policy issue and will feature expert presentations and moderated discussions. The OECD Secretariat will develop discussion notes for each workshop that will be adjusted to account for workshops presentations and discussions. The collection of notes will be made available on the YEPA website.

This includes, for example, support for more and better jobs through the European Employment Strategy, free movement of workers and coordination of social security schemes, and supporting social inclusion by supporting efforts to combat poverty and social exclusion, reform social protection systems, assess new demographic and social developments.
